Safety Requirements & Precautions for the Workplace

The ACC processes around 17,000 claims for eye injury accidents a year, yet it is estimated that around 90% of accidents could be prevented – many simply by donning safety eyewear.

What causes Eye Injuries?

Over 90% of eye injuries are due to:

- Being struck in the eye by flying particles and objects (nuts, bolts, nails, bearings, springs, fragments and so on). The blow suffered either grazes, bruises, tears or penetrates the eye.
- Striking the eye against moving or stationary objects such as tools, cabinets and other equipment in your work area.
- Eye contact with irritants, dusts, hot liquids, liquid metals and chemicals. Some of the most extensive corneal scars result from chemicals such as lime and concentrated acids.
- Exposure to welding flash, laser beams, infrared radiation and laser reflection.

Eye Hazards & Employer/ Employee Responsibilities (OSH Requirements)

Many work hazards present the risk of serious harm to the eyes. The Health & Safety in Employment Act 1992 requires employers to take all practicable steps to eliminate these hazards, or to isolate the hazard from the employee.

Where this is not possible, employers must take all practicable steps to minimise the likelihood of harm to employees. They must provide suitable eye protection for employees and ensure that it is used.

Employees have a duty to wear the eye protection while they are exposed to the hazard.
